




Mr John Holmes appointed as new Chair for Management Committee and Trustees

Shrove Tuesday

This year's Shrove Tuesday event was a great success attended by over 60 people. Even a penguin! Andrew Dixon from Newcastle Gateshead Initiative talk was entitled 'A tourism boom or clutching at straws?'. Andrew began by talking about Scunthorpe and whether people ever went there and stayed overnight. Have you? Of course the point he was making was that we have so much to offer and that we should be proud of it. His job as Chief Executive was to encourage people to visit and work in our region. He said "the best tourist comes and stays forever". He spoke about the life and vitality which had increased in the last 10 years. We did not speak about the housing agenda which is also part of Andrew's brief.

We are grateful for all he does. We would like to see Newcastle and Gateshead come even closer together. We wonder if Gateshead has any plans for penguins as well as us. Breakfast Conversation

Alan Clarke, the Chief Executive of One North East, a Liverpool fan, braved many Newcastle fans to speak at our sell out Breakfast Conversation. His talk was entitled 'O.N.E Does it deliver? Does it have a lasting impact on Business and the Community?' Some of the question's we were hoping Alan might be answering were: How far do the various agencies work together? Do strategies actually result in action and things which will last? Where does the money go and to who? What is his vision for the future? Alan proved a candid and honest speaker. He was refreshingly open and honest. He spoke about how One North East was formed, how it operated and how it was assessed. We all received a O.N.E 'pocket bible' of how it works and its strategies. Alan spoke about the many responsibilities old and new which he leads on. He spoke about the board of trustees and the skills and knowledge they bring. He spoke about delivery mechanisms. You could see what a difficult job he had in trying to work with other agencies to obtain clarity and common goals. The questioning and discussion ranged from immigration, tourism, the northern way, economic health to iconic buildings and their effect or not on poorer areas. There was lot's to discuss about attracting more talent, leaders and inward migration. As with many other organisations Alan had a vision which he clearly demonstrated to everyone. He was realistic about what his organisation could achieve with the money they were actually allocated. It remains to be seen if the money he has spent will continue to have an impact. Just look at Newcastle United lots of money lots of support no success. We think both Alan and Liverpool at least have had some. Many of us in the room hoped and prayed that organisations such as O.N.E do work together to have a lasting and tangible benefit for those in our city and region who are often out of work and living in situations many of us would find difficult and unacceptable. Alan was thanked and presented with a penguin.


